Another good spot, though less reliable than the one mentioned above, is Deep Creek Campground in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park near Bryson City. Signs beginning in Bryson City will direct you to the campground. Look for the birds on the hillside above the creek about ½

mile beyond the picnic shelter on the side opposite the campground.

These birds frequent brushy slightly open growth rather than forest. May and June are the best months for finding them. After that, the birds are not singing and are very hard to find.
